A Critical Moment

R.D. GLENN, RECTOR

I am writing this AGM report while preparing for a day of tests, including blood work, Echocardiogram and Cardiolite Exercise testing. So I will keep it brief.

MARKED BY GROWTH

This past year was marked by growth in our congregation and church family. There are now more than 550 people on our parish list, i.e., people who call St. George's their home church. Not only have we seen growth numerically but also growth in depth. I could tell countless stories of people who have, over this past year, come to a living faith in Jesus Christ. It gives me great joy to see people leaning into the gospel and finding strength for the day.

COURAGEOUS STEPS

Our church family is at a critical moment. We could be satisfied with a full church every Sunday and paying the bills each year. Or, we could take bold, courageous steps of faith to heed our Master's Great Commission. I know that for you, as for me, there is only one option.

BARRIERS

Pressing on in mission has meant addressing the structural and organizational barriers that have limited our reach and growth. I thank

God for Jonathan Burns who facilitated our Executive Council in renewing our mission and vision statements, developing a strategic plan and reorganizing our reporting and decision-making structures.

A THIRD SERVICE

Further, pressing on in mission means that we will be launching a third worship service this Spring. It is necessary to relieve some of the pressure from our overcrowded morning worship services, while at the same time, potentially reaching a new demographic in our mission field.

Finally, God is calling us to step on the gas rather than circle the wagons (pardon the mixed metaphor ...).

You will notice that we are proposing a stretch budget for 2020. Budgets represent vision, values and vocation. The biggest increase in the proposed budget over the prior year comes from the addition of two staff positions. First, we are, God-willing, bringing Len Finn on as full time Associate Pastor. His role will include overseeing the Ministries Group, developing Adult Education and connecting people to people, people to God and people to God's Word. He will graduate to full time when he graduates from school! Second, we have budgeted for a full time Youth Pastor. This is a gaping hole in our ministry that needs to be addressed. I can't overstate the urgency. We have so many youth-aged members of our church family who need to be discipled, not to mention the many, many children coming up into that age group.

Jesus' calling demands that we move forward together, courageously and circumspectly.

The gospel is the power of God for salvation.

Training in Truth for Maturity

NEW MEN'S MINISTRY IN 2019

TTM was launched in March 2019. Its mission statement is as follows:

It is our mission to train the men of St. George's in the truth of God's word so that through the power of the Holy Spirit they may be sanctified and grow into mature Christian servants.

BUILDING CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY

TTM seeks to achieve its mission statement by building Christian community amongst the men of St. George's through fellowship breakfasts and excellent programming.

With the exception of July and August, TTM generally meets on the second Saturday of each month from 8:30 am to 10:00 am. The meetings start with a fellowship breakfast which is followed with a teaching time. Our gatherings have averaged approximately 20 to 25 attendees.

PROGRAMMING

In terms of programming, the three (3) pillars of the ministry are: 1) apologetics-- teaching as to the truth of God's word; 2) teaching on how to read and study the Bible; and, 3) teaching on the characteristics of a Godly man.

This last year we studied the following topics:

- A why and how to read your Bible;
- The 'Case for Christ' DVD;
- Inductive bible study;
- John Piper's 'Look at the Book' series;
- Servanthood;
- The characteristics of a Godly husband;
- Confronting negative and unbiblical views of heaven- why a Godly man should live for his eternal reward;
- Money and possessions from an eternal perspective.

The topics were presented through live speakers and/or leaders preparing questions and answers for video materials. The following men have presented on the foregoing topics: Stephen Wishart, Mark Jurgens, Bill Horricks, Kelvin Loveless and Bryan Hunt.

WHAT IS BIBLICAL COUNSELING?

Biblical Counseling is counseling with the Bible as our sure and unshakeable foundation. We believe that God's Word is more than facts and ancient stories- God's Word is active and living and speaks into our lives today (Heb 4:12). Whatever is going on in life- our joys, our sorrows, our heartaches, our fears, our messy relationships, our temptations- the Bible points us to a God who is not absent or aloof or far away from us. The Bible points us to a Father who loved us so much that He sent His Son, Jesus, to experience the ultimate suffering on our behalf and die for

our sins, so that we can approach a holy God in our times of need and experience His amazing and immense mercy towards us.

Biblical Counseling is about a relationship. God has not left us to figure things out or fix things on our own. He has given us Christ, the Word of God made flesh, to minister to us. In Christ, we are a new creation. When we are in a living relationship with Jesus, we bring our struggles and problems before Him, knowing that real change happens through His unlimited power and mighty work, not our own limited efforts.

This life is hard. We live in a broken world, and our lives experience this brokenness in multi-faceted ways. Biblical Counseling is about coming alongside of someone and offering them hope in Christ when they are

WHO IS BIBLICAL COUNSELING FOR?

No one was meant to walk this life alone. The Expanse of His Glory

BIG COUNTRY SKIES

Last July, our family took the plunge and left the city of Hamilton behind for a more rural life. We bought a country house in the farmlands of West Lincoln. The house is nestled in the midst of expansive farmfields as far as the eye can see. Both Emily and I grew up in a rural area, and since our marriage we have both pined to move back to the country, so this move was a coming home, of sorts.

Since the move, it has been a joy watching our kids play under the big country skies. In fact, after a few weeks of living in the country again I realized how much I had missed seeing the vastness of the sky. In the city you rarely see more than a sliver of the sky between the busyness of encroaching buildings. It has done my soul good seeing the sun set every night - to see thunderstorms rolling in miles away across the fields.

I think, similarly, worship gives us a wider view of the glory of God. We spend much of our lives blinded by the busyness of our lives. Between our jobs, families, and other responsibilities we often lose sight of God's glory. We forget to look up. And even if we do, we often only see a sliver of it between the obstructions we have built around ourselves. But when we gather to worship we are reminded of who God is and who we are. The buildings dissapear and we begin to see the expanse of God's beauty, that has been there all along. Worship realigns our eyes and our affections. As we worship, God reveals to us the full expanse of His glory. And the more we behold the glory of God in worship the more we begin to strip away the things in our lives that we have placed in front of his glory. Until more and more of the unobstructions dissapear and we see the skies - big and clear.

OUR SERVICES

At St. George's, we believe that God is always doing something new in His church and that we can always learn from what God has already done. This truth takes shape in our worship music. We embrace new music that seeks to find new voice to the glories of God, and we are enriched by singing the ancient truths of the hymns written by the saints over the centuries.

It is our desire to use music and liturgy to help people behold the glory of God, in a way that resounds in the hearts of every generation. We do our utmost to create a worship environment that can be accessed by every age group, from the little children – to our senior members. As we all prefer different styles, volume levels, and keys, this can be a challenge. I so

appreciate the laying down of personal-preference that I see from many of you. This truly is a 'sacrifice of praise' and true worship of the King. Thank you.

As worship pastor I take very seriously the words we are putting in the mouths of the saints. The lyrics we sing shape our theology and our very view of God Himself. If we only sing about God's power and might, we may develop a theology of a strong, but impersonal God. If we only sing about God's intimate love for us, then we may develop a theology of a loving, but not all-powerful

God. We want to lead songs that speak of the whole spectrum of God's character; loving, yet holy; merciful, yet just; intimate, yet fearsome. And most of all we want to lead people to the Gospel. In Christ we see the fullness of God on display; His whole character and his heart for His world. That is why we never tire of singing about the cross and the glory of the Risen Christ.

As an Anglican Church, we take the 39 articles of religion seriously, so we structure our Sunday worship with an emphasis on Word and sacrament (articles VI, XXV) and in a language easily understandable by the people (article XXIV). This is why we put God's Word out in front of everything we do, and why we celebrate the Lord's supper together every Sunday. And in all these things, our aim is to do them in a way that is easily understandable for the Christian and non-christian alike.

Each week I am grateful to play alongside such talented musicians, who love to create music that glorifies Jesus and serve His church. Our worship music team consists of Scott Hunt (drums/percussion), Julia Selby (Piano/Vocals), Carny Biggar (Bass/Piano/Vocals), Joseph Smith (Violin), Shirantha Beddage (Piano), Jessica Underdown (Vocals), Len Finn (Bass), Gillian Fernie (Piano), Bristol Surajdeen (Guitar/Drums), Stephanie Finn (Vocals), Jan Chen (Guitar/Bass), Maggie Wilson, (Guitar/Vocals), Joshua Burns (Guitar/Vocals), Jonathan Burns (Guitar/Vocals), David Lammers (Piano), Sabina Lammers (Violin), Christiana Lammers (Cello), and Richelle Hunt (Vocals). Media

ONLINE

St. George's website is our primary home for news, events, and content, but, more and more, social media has become the means by which we deliver this content.

WEBSITE

In 2019, we had 14,464 unique visitors come to our website from dozens of countries. People from around the globe listened to our sermons and read our online articles. For many people, our website will be their first introduction to our church and we have worked hard to make it a vibrant, easily navigable, attractive, and useful place to visit. Over the last 9 months, I have been working on a redesign of the website, which will launch in 2020.

FACEBOOK

St. George's Facebook Page experienced major growth in 2019, with now 691 followers (up 84 from the previous year). Our Facebook posts reached over 50,000 people in the last year. We also have our private St. George's Community Group, which has 101 members - exclusively from our congregation and is a great place for prayer requests, news updates, discussions and other community building posts.

INSTAGRAM

We also saw growth in our Instagram account with 646 followers (+38 from the previous year). We uploaded 38 posts in the last year, with an approximate reach of 400-1000 unique accounts per post. The goal of these posts is to remind people of the Gospel throughout their week, because we believe Christian growth is intimately tied to remembering and rehearsing the Gospel to our souls. The posts are typically images with scriptures or quotes pulled out from the previous Sunday's sermon.

YOUTUBE

Every week we livestream the video from our 10:15am Sunday morning Service on YouTube. Many people from around the world have been able to join with us as we worship God together. In the last year, our service videos were viewed over 6358 times, with a watch time of 69,630 minutes. We have 251 people who subscribe to our YouTube channel.

Our twitter account isn't as active, but we update it with all of the new posts from our website. We have 129 followers.

Dear friends,

I'm so grateful for all that the Lord is doing here at St. George's and so thankful that He's made me and my family a part of it all. Currently, I serve quarter-time (in theory!) at the church, with the primary responsibility of supporting the rector and assisting him in pastoring St. George's. I preach and lead roughly half of the 8:30am services, support Ray David in preaching and leading the 10:15am services, and meet pastorally with parishioners.

MINISTRIES GROUP

Recently, these responsibilities have expanded to include oversight responsibilities for the Ministries Group at St. George's. This group encompasses the ministries at our church that are focused on reaching, discipling and growing the people God has entrusted to St. George's from infancy of faith into mature, joy-filled, gospel-shaped followers of Christ who reach, disciple and grow others, drawing others to Him, not only with words, but also through the character of their lives. These ministries include Outreach, Newcomers and Mom2Mom, which draw people into the life of faith at St. George's; Small Groups, Monthly Home Fellowship, Pastoral Care/Crisis, Training in Truth for Maturity (our men's ministry), Take a Moment and Afternoon Women's Fellowship (our women's ministries), our 'In Touch' Senior's Ministry, all of which aim to disciple and grow our adults; the Nursery, Sunday School, and Youth Ministry, which nurture our young people in the faith; and Mission, which aims to share the love of Christ tangibly with those beyond our immediate reach. I encourage you to read and be encouraged by the individual reports from the leaders of those ministries. I am so thankful to God for the call, vision and energy that He has given to each one of them.

GROUP GOALS

We are only in early months of our new organization, so my goals for this first year are focused on creating an organization that nurtures, encourages and helps those ministry leaders do what they have been called to do, as well as to create systems for launching successful new ministries at St. George's. As a first step, I wanted to assemble a small team of experienced, insightful ministry leaders to help me lead this group. This was accomplished when Angela Hunt, Catherine Neal, and my wife, Stephanie, agreed to take on this responsibility. As far as I'm concerned, this is a dream team of Gospel-focus, enthusiasm and know-how. Next, our focus will be the creation of systems for improving communication

and coordination between those ministries, as well as with senior staff and with the larger body of Christ at St. George's. Additionally, we want to identify the gaps in the continuum of Christian formation in the range of ministries at St. George's and develop a plan for closing those gaps. We are, for instance, very aware of the deep need for a vibrant youth program and are working actively to meet that need. I am also concerned about the

lack of a focused adult education program and it is my intention to develop personally such a program in the months ahead. We have run a number of seminary level courses through Ryle Seminary in recent years and it is my hope to continue to do so, but I would also like to see additional—and less formal—resources available here.

GETTING PLUGGED IN

All that said, if you are looking to get better plugged into the life of St. George's, but don't know where to start, please do talk to me. I can hopefully direct you to a place of fellowship or service that is suited to you and will grow you in the life of the Body of Christ and the lived experience of the Gospel.

DOCTORATE PROGRESS

Lastly, as many of you know, I am finishing up a doctorate in Old Testament studies at the University of Toronto. (It occurs to me that I think I've written something like that in my report three years running, but I really mean it this time!) Currently, I am in the

process of final edits and reference checks on my thesis on the Book of Ecclesiastes. It is not exactly the most inspiring part of the process, but it is good to be nearing the finish line. God willing, I should submit it in March or April, and I will likely defend it the early fall. As always, thank you so much for all your prayers and encouragement.

ALWAYS BIGGER AND BETTER

As 2020 begins, I am excited for the ways in which the Lord seems to be moving at St. George's. We have some great plans for the year ahead, but it's important to remember that the Lord's plans are always bigger and better than we can imagine, and so my prayer is that we wouldn't get in His way, but trust more and more in Him and the call He has put on us for growing the Gospel in this little corner of His kingdom.

Executive Council

KELVIN LOVELESS. EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MEMBER

Another year has come to a close. It has been a privileged to serve as your Executive council (EC). The members this past year were Ray David Glenn, Clair Dirker, Julia Selby, Mark Jurgens and Kelvin Loveless, supported by Gillian Fernie as secretary and Dan Coverdale as treasurer.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

During the first part of the year we completed our strategic planning activities with the help of Johnathan Burns. The updated mission and vision where shared with the congregation. A significant realization during the process was that the growth of the church seemed to be hitting a glass ceiling at about 250 people a week. To address this we have revamped the leadership structure to appoint individuals or teams to coordinate and support various aspects of the church; operations, ministries, facilities & administration and weekly services. In the account of the children of Israel in the wilderness Moses is advised to share the burden of leadership with others. In the same way the leadership is being shared so that we can support a larger congregation.

There is one significant issue that was discovered late in 2019. During the process of reviewing EC terms and preparing nominations for our AGM, It

was discovered the one of the EC members, Julie Selby, had been incorrectly appointed to a third consecutive term in contradiction to the Bylaws. The bylaws state that directors of the EC may serve up to two terms and then must take at least a 10 month break before serving again. Terms are limited to two years. The EC and Secretary regret missing this, and apologize. We should have been more careful. Once we discovered this we decided that we would still include Julia in our meetings, but she would abstain from making motions or voting.

So what is the implication of this? If we look at the way EC has worked over the last year, we ran on consensuses. Votes were passed unanimously, and on occasion one of the members would abstain. Meetings were held with all members present or one missing. If Julia was removed there would still have been quorum and all of the votes would have passed. There is also the issue that Julia was the mover or seconder of some of the motions that were made at EC. In order to move passed this mistake we will be asking the membership to vote on a motion that this oversight and mistake does not invalidate the EC's actions. The draft motion is "The Executive Councils motions or actions in 2019 shall not be considered invalid due to Julie Selby being appointed to a third consecutive term, in contradiction to the Bylaws two term limit".

Again the EC and secretary apologize for this oversight. I has been an honour to serve as your executive council over the previous year. May God continue to grow His church!

The two prevailing challenges are -

- 1. Not having to enough open small groups.
- 2. Placing newcomers into existing small groups.

We are working with the newcomer team to tackle the latter but it is also connected to the former.

SMALL GROUP LEADERS MEETING

Halfway through the year, we had a small group leaders' meeting, which included potential leaders who were interested in small groups, to discuss the future and vision of small groups. Thank you to those who attended that meeting, your input and interest was valued. Please stay tuned for the actions that came out of that meeting.

Missions

In 2019, St. George's continued to partner with Yonge Street Mission (YSM) in Toronto. The Bridges Program at YSM works with the "generationally poor" and provides community and fellowship twice a week, which includes a community meal. St. George's contributes to one of these community meals each month.

As in the previous year, St. George's continues not to have a specific budget line item for international missions but rather, we respond to needs as they come up. In 2018, we began a new partnership with St. Peter's Church in Gulu, Uganda, where we raised funds to finish the floors of the church building. This year, we did not have any new fundraising initiatives, but we continued to receive updates about the church in Uganda, their use of the building, and their continued development efforts as they raised more money.

The vision is still for this initiative to only be Phase 1 of our partnership with St. Peter's as we build a long term partnership with the church. We are looking into Phase 2, 3, etc. where we can contribute to finishing more of the church building and it can be used as a hub in the community. Perhaps in the future, we can send teams there and they can send teams here as we partner in the gospel, since there is a lot to learn both ways!

We were also given the exciting opportunity to raise funds to send Anna O'Drowsky, a young woman who grew up at St. George's, on a mission trip to El Papalote, Mexico in February. Anna's team led Christian programs for children, youth and families, as well as helped with community housing and clean-up projects.

Take a Moment continues to meet monthly and promote the formation of deeper friendships amongst the women of St. George's. Over the last year we've seen a lot of new women attend, both regular church attendees and women who are new to the church. TAM offers a great way to be intentional about getting to know new women and inviting them into relationship as well as staying connected prayerfully and practically to women in the church. Monthly meetings create a space where women are served and have time and space to truly get to know one another at a depth that leads to spiritual, emotional and practical support.

Over the course of the year TAM has served approximately 75 different women with attendance at individual gatherings ranging on average from 15-30 women and our Christmas dinner having 52 in attendance! We continue to see women connecting from a wide range of ages and demographics. The private Facebook group has grown to 74 members. This acts as an online space for women to encourage each other, share immediate needs and keep others up to date on what's happening in their lives. Those who do not use Facebook are updated through email and bulletin announcements.

As we look to the future, Take a Moment will continue to have monthly inhome gatherings and invest in the lives of St. George's women. To support women who struggle with driving to unknown locations at night we will now offer a carpool leaving from the church parking lot. We will also ask

a different woman to share what God sets on her heart each meeting.

Many women report that TAM plays a major role in helping them feel connected and offers a level of friendship that goes beyond Sunday morning chats. EASTER EGG HUNT

On Palm Sunday, we hosted our 4th annual community Easter Egg Hunt, which welcomes Burlington children and their families for egg hunting, crafts, face painting, and a community lunch. Due to the wet weather, we held the egg hunt entirely indoors this year and the pony rides were cancelled. Attendance also took a dip to around 400 children and their families, but those who attended loved spending time in our church, seeing the nave, and getting to know our volunteers. As always, this is one of our most popular events. Walker's Chocolates donated 500 goody bags of chocolate and candy, and lunch was donated by Panago Pizza and other local businesses.

BREAKING BREAD FARMERS MARKET

After shutting down our weekly food truck festival at the end of last summer, our committee discussed options for an outreach program that would still reach the Alton Village community, provide a regular community hub, and serve the whole family. We landed on a farmers market, but unfortunately due to a few months of appeals to the city regarding permitting, we got a later start that we had hoped in July. For

a few weeks we hosted 5-10 food and produce vendors in our parking lot and grilled hamburgers and hot dogs for at-cost donations, welcoming around 100-250 people each week. We'll be meeting shortly to discuss whether to bring back the market in 2020.

TREE LIGHTING

We rang in the Christmas season with our neighbours, lighting our indoor tree with celebratory caroling, cookies, and hot cocoa. This year we welcomed Santa to the party and Bristol kindly offered free family photos to all of the attendees. We hosted around 175 people and had lots of fun. Thank you to everyone who baked, served, welcomed, and sang along!



2019 SURVEY RESULTS


Do you read your bible more or less than last year?

Answered: 86 Skipped: 1




Do you pray more or less than last year?



Building Maintenance

TEAM, REPORT

The Maintenance Team consisting of Brian Duke, John Billis and Ed Lewis continued to oversee the care of our church building ably assisted by Gillian who contacts and coordinates with external service providers.

- After suffering several heating problems early in the year we contracted a more aggressive preventative maintenance program for our heating and ventilation equipment with a new service provider resulting in more reliable service.
- The lawn maintenance program continued with the same provider and the lawn sprinkling system was commissioned and decommissioned for the year.
- We also continued with our same highly successful janitorial service.
- Blinds were donated by a parishioner and installed on windows on the Palladium Way side of the church.

- A defibrillator system was purchased and installed.
- A bi-monthly insect suppression contract was placed to prevent uninvited guests.
- We experienced a number of false alarms early in the year and tightened up procedures to eliminate them.
- Peeling paint around the front window in the sanctuary was removed and new paint applied.
- Monthly fire system tests were conducted and monthly inspections of fire extinguishers and emergency lighting systems were carried out.
 One emergency lighting battery was replaced. The master Emergency Fire Plan was reviewed and updated.
- We hired a new contractor to do the annual testing of our fire extinguishers.
- A leak in the Fellowship Room door was investigated and hopefully fixed.
- Two Sunday School/Nursery mock emergency evacuations were conducted.
- The annual water back flow test was done and passed.
- We had minor cracks in some mortar joints inspected by a masonry contractor and they will be repaired in the spring.
- A number of other minor fixes and adjustments were made.
