





A wry comment from a well known Christian, Charles Spurgeon: 'He observed that by perseverance, the snail reached the Ark...'

St Paul tells us, 'perseverance' produces character, and character produces hope. (Romans 5: 3 - 4) The original word translated from Greek means 'Steadfastness, constancy and endurance'. So now we know that to persevere means much...




We at St. George's would like to support at least one family. I ask for your prayerful consideration of this program.

Inspiration



[Bishop John Charles Ryle was a great preacher of the gospel in the nineteenth century. He served for thirty nine years in country parishes before becoming the first Bishop of Liverpool in 1880. He has left us many treasures from his writing and preaching including this abridged selection from his book "Old Paths". Eds.]

Inspiration is the very keel and foundation of Christianity. If Christians have no Divine book to turn to as the warrant of their doctrine and practice, they have no solid ground for present peace or hope, and no right to claim the attention of mankind. They are building on quicksand,

and their faith is vain. We ought to be able to say boldly, "We are what we are, and we do what we do, because we have here a book which we believe to be the Word of God.

I shall not waste time in proving that the Scriptures are genuine and authentic, that they were really written by the very men who profess to have written them, and that they contain the very things which they wrote. I shall bring forward the book itself, and put it in the witness box. I shall try to show that nothing can possibly account for the Bible being what it is, and doing what it has done, except that it is the Word of God. The Bible itself, fairly examined, is the best witness of its own inspiration. I shall content myself with stating some plain facts about the Bible which can neither be denied or explained away. They are simple facts, which require no knowledge of Hebrew, or Greek, or Latin, in order to be understood; yet they are facts which prove conclusively that the Bible is superhuman, or not of man.

- I. It is a fact, that there is an extraordinary fullness and richness in the contents of the Bible. It throws more light on a vast number of important subjects than all other books in the world put together. It boldly handles matters which are beyond the reach of man, when left to himself. It treats of things which are mysterious and invisible, -- the soul, the world to come, and eternity, -- depths which man has no line to fathom.
- The Bible alone gives a reasonable account of the beginning and the end of the globe on which we live. It starts from the birthday of sun, moon, stars, and earth in their present order, and shows us creation in its cradle. It foretells the dissolution of all things, when the earth and all its works shall be burned up, and shows us creation in its grave. It tells us the story of the world's youth; and it tells us the story of its old age. It gives us a picture of its first days; and it gives us a picture of its last. How vast and important is this knowledge! Can this be the work of uninspired man? Let us try to answer that question.

The Bible alone gives a true and faithful account of man. It describes him as a fallen creature, of his own nature inclined to evil, --a creature needing not only a pardon, but a new heart, to make him fit for heaven. It shows him to be a corrupt being under every circumstance, when left to himself, -- corrupt in the face of warnings, promises, miracles, judgments, mercies. In one word, it shows man to be by nature always a sinner.

The Bible alone gives us true views of God. By nature man knows nothing clearly or fully about Him. All his conceptions of Him are low, groveling, and debased.

By the Bible we know that God hates sin. By the Bible we know that God loves sinners. By the Bible we learn that God knows all things. We see Him foretelling things hundreds and thousands of years before they take place, and as He foretells so it comes to pass. The Bible alone teaches that God has made a full, perfect, and complete provision for the salvation of fallen man. It tells us of an atonement made for the sin of the world, by the sacrifice and death of God's own Son upon the cross. It tells us that by His death for sinners, as their Substitute, He obtained eternal redemption of all that believe on Him. The claims of God's broken law have now been satisfied. Christ has suffered for sin, the just for the unjust. God can now be just, and yet the justifier of the ungodly. It tells us that there is now a complete remedy for the guilt of sin, -- even the precious blood of Christ; and peace, and rest of conscience for all who believe on Christ. . . . It shows us the Holy Spirit quickening believers, and making them new creatures. It promises a new heart and a new nature to all who will hear Christ's voice, and follow Him.

The Bible alone explains the state of things that we see in the world around us. There are many things on earth which a natural man cannot explain. The amazing inequality of conditions, the poverty and distress, the oppression and persecution, the shaking and tumults, the failures of statesmen and legislators, the constant existence of uncured evils and abuses; all these things are often puzzling to him. He sees but does not understand. But the Bible makes it all clear. The Bible can tell him that the whole world lieth in wickedness, -- that the prince of the world, the devil, is everywhere, -- and that it is vain to look for perfection in the present order of things. The Bible will tell him that neither laws nor education can ever change men's hearts. The Bible will tell him that there is "a good time" certainly coming, -- a time of perfect knowledge, perfect justice, perfect happiness, and perfect peace. But the Bible will tell him that this time

shall not be brought in by any power but that of Christ coming to earth again. All these are things which men could find nowhere but in the Bible.

II. It is another fact that there is an extraordinary unity and harmony in the contents of the Bible, which is entirely above man. Here is a long book written by not less than thirty different persons. The writers were men of every rank and class in society. They lived at different intervals over a space of 1500 years; and the greater part of them never saw each other face to face. And yet there is perfect harmony among all these writers? They all write as if they were under one dictation. The style and hand-writing may vary, but the mind that runs through their work is always one and the same. They all tell the same story. They all give one account of man, -- one account of God, -- one account of the way of salvation, -- one account of the human heart.

III. It is another fact that there is an extraordinary wisdom, sublimity and majesty in the style of the Bible, which is above man. Strange and unlikely as it was, the writers of Scripture have produced a book which even at this day is utterly unrivalled. Nothing can be compared with the Bible. There is a strain and a style and a tone of thought about it, which separates it from all other writings. There are no weak points, and motes and flaws, and blemishes. There is no mixture of infirmity and feebleness, such as you will find in the works of even the best Christians.

IV. It is another fact that there is an extraordinary accuracy in the facts and statements of the Bible, which is above man. Infidels have assailed it in vain. There it stands, -- perfect, and fresh, and complete, as it did eighteen centuries ago. The march of intellect never overtakes it. The wisdom of wise men never gets beyond it. The science of philosophers never proves it wrong. Nothing is found that overturns one jot or tittle of the Bible's historical statements. How shall we account for this fact?

V. It is another fact that there is in the Bible an extraordinary suitableness to the spiritual wants of mankind. It exactly meets the heart of man in every rank or class, in every country and climate, in every age or period of life. It is the only book in existence which is never out of place and out of date. It is the book of the poor and unlearned no less than of the rich and the philosopher. It suits all ages, ranks, climates, minds, conditions. It is the one book which suits the world.

VI. Last, it is a great fact that the Bible has had a most extraordinary effect on the condition of those nations in which it has been known, taught, and read. I invite any honest-minded reader to look at a map of the world, and see what a story that map tells.

I place these six facts about the Bible before my readers and I ask them to consider them well. Upon any other principle than that of divine inspiration, these six facts appear to me inexplicable and unaccountable. Here is a book which is written by a succession of Jews, in a little corner of the world, which positively stands alone. Not only were the writers isolated and cut off in a peculiar manner from other nations, but they belonged to a people who have never produced any other book of note except the Bible! There is not the slightest proof that, unassisted and left to themselves, they were capable of writing anything remarkable. Yet these men have given the world a volume which for depth, unity, sublimity, accuracy, suitableness to the wants of man, and the power of influencing its readers, is perfectly unrivalled. How can this be explained? How can it be accounted for? To my mind there is only one answer. The writers of the Bible were divinely helped and qualified for the work which they did. The book which they have given us was written by inspiration of God.



The Necessity of Knowing Ourselves

a sermon preached by Charles Simeon (abridged)

[Charles Simeon was an Anglican divine who lived 1759—1836. When Charles Simeon entered King's College, Cambridge, he discovered that attendance at Holy Communion was compulsory. His preparation for taking communion led to his conversion. From the time of his ordination, he encountered great hostility and persecution for the sake of the gospel. Appointed vicar of Holy Trinity, Cambridge in 1782, he ministered there until his death. Eds.]

"The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked: who can know it?" Jeremiah 17:9

I. The deceitfulness of the human heart.

There is perhaps no stronger proof of the deceitfulness of the heart than the power it possesses to hide its deceitfulness from us. The heart deceives not only others but itself also. Of active agents, Satan is beyond all comparison the greatest deceiver, except the heart: he, when he is deceiving, is conscious that he is deceiving: he does not for a moment imagine that he is speaking the truth: but the heart persuades itself that it is not guilty of any imposition: it is as confident of its own integrity, as if it were really upright; and as fully convinced of the truth of its representations, as if they were really true. This is the case universally amongst those who are yet in a carnal and unconverted state.

Of this power of the heart to deceive itself, all men are conscious, in relation to others; but all overlook it in relation to themselves. Nothing is easier than for a spectator to form a tolerably correct judgment of the motives and principles of



others, and to see the obliquity of them, whilst the actors themselves imagine themselves actuated by the purest feelings. Justly it is said by Him who cannot err, that "the heart is deceitful above all things," not excepting even Satan himself, the great deceiver of mankind.

II. The Wickedness of the human heart.

Know then, that the heart by nature is **universally** wicked, **unsearchably** wicked, and **in-curably** wicked.

It is universally wicked, both in all its powers, and in every exercise of each. We do not say that there may not be a considerable portion of comparative good in men so that they may be more amiable, and more worthy members of society than others; but there is nothing positively good in them. The understanding of man is darkened, by sin; the will is rendered perverse and obstinate; the affections are sensualized; the conscience is made partial and insensible; and the whole man is altogether become abominable; his heart being the seat of every lust, the womb from whence every sin proceeds. It must be remembered, moreover, that man sins by defect, as well as by a direct and willful opposition to his duty; so that even if we should imagine human nature to be possessed of all the excellencies which its most sanguine advocates can imagine, still we must all adopt for ourselves the confession of St. Paul, "In me, that is, in my flesh, dwelleth no good thing."

Again the heart is unsearchably wicked. Not only are we unable to discover all the evil that is in the hearts of others; we cannot even in our own. Suppose a man to have discovered ever so much of his own depravity, there will yet be depths within him unfathomable and unexplored. The truth is, a man could not bear a full sight of his own heart all at once; it would drive him to utter despair.

Once more, the heart is incurably evil. Verily our case, as to any human remedies at least, is desperate. We may on many occasions restrain its actings; but we cannot subdue it, we cannot mortify it, we cannot purge it away; it is like the leprosy in the house, that could not be in any way removed, but by pulling down the house altogether. This, it must be confessed, is a melancholy picture: but it is the truth of God, and is known, and felt, to be so, by all who are taught of God.

Now we can clearly see the true ground of the doctrine of the New Birth. It is surprising how often the Scripture speaks respecting the being "born again", the being "begotten of God," and "born of God:" which terms must of necessity indicate, not merely an outward change of state or profession in baptism, but an inward change of heart, a passing from "darkness to light," "from death to life." It is to be born not of water only, but of the Spirit also. When that takes place, we die to sin, and begin to live unto righteousness: we become "new creatures in Christ Jesus: old things pass away; and all things become new." This change is absolutely and indispensably necessary to the salvation of the soul: "verily, verily, I say unto you," says our Lord, except a man be born again, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." Why so? Why must every child of man undergo such a change as this? For this plain reason: he is so radically corrupt in every faculty and power

of his soul by nature, as to be absolutely incapable of enjoying heaven even if he were there.

We see from hence, our utter need of an interest in Christ-- We call the Lord Jesus Christ, "Saviour:" let us rely on Him as our Saviour; let us trust in his blood and righteousness as the only meritorious ground of our hope; let us glory in Him, as "all our salvation and all our desire."
