

After leaving Corinth, Paul caught wind that some of the Christian converts were doubting the resurrection. We see the same thing in our world and in the visible church today. Moralism displaces Christian faith and being a good person becomes an end in itself. You hear people say things like, "Even if Christianity isn't true, at the end I will have the joy of having lived a good life." St. Paul identifies this line of thinking as hogwash.

Alleluia! Christ is Risen!

"Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you The loss say that there is no resurrection of the dead? But if there is no resurrection of causes the heart the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain. We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified about God that he raised Christ, whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied."

1 Corinthians 15:12-18

Pathetic! If Christ wasn't raised from the dead, then no one will be. If this is true that no one will be raised and we have placed our hope in the resurrection,

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• both Jesus' and ours, then we are pitiable. When we consider the resurrection of Jesus we are playing for all of the marbles!

But the great Easter truth is simply that Jesus was raised from the dead. His was a resurrection that not even Pilate, with his armed guards, could suppress.

The powers of influence in our world still seek to hold Jesus in his tomb. Their efforts today are as futile as Pilate's were 2000 years ago.

Your transformed life proves the resurrection.

The certainty you enjoy in the face of your own mortality confirms that Jesus has conquered death. No one sneaked past Pilate's guards to escape with Jesus' body. He was indeed raised from the dead. So, all who place their trust in Him are neither pitiable nor pathetic but robustly confident.

With saints throughout the millennia we cry aloud, "Alleluia, Christ is Risen!"

I have started my new career working with seniors in long term care

homes. I am enjoying it very much. However, my heart feels sad sometimes to see how disease can rob persons of their strength, vitality, independence and even dignity. I find myself wondering how someone who cannot move any limbs in their bodies and barely talk, could go on and even experience joy.

This feeling came back to me when I watched a movie recently called "One True Thing", with Meryl Streep, my favorite actress. She was playing a lady whose body was wasting away with cancer and the ways she coped with it, and also how the different family members coped with it as well. I was struck with how hopeless life can be apart from the resurrection of Jesus Christ and this is not even considering our sinful natures.

Over a month ago, I was at a Bible Study on Colossians. The main focus of that particular day was focusing on things above and not on earthly things. I told the ladies that Heaven was always in my mind and heart, which surprised one lady in particular. I told the ladies that I did not have a death wish but that it was an affirmation to me that what we experience here on earth, whether good or bad, is part of another storyline, an eternal story that the Lord is writing. I flew from BC to Ontario to spend time with my father in what was to be his last month here on earth. I had flown back and forth a few times with the various surgeries he underwent with his battle against colon cancer. When I look back at the pictures of him particularly during that last year, I see a very sick man; but when I spent time with him, he seemed to have a glorious aura about him that could not be captured on film. He would say things like, "Heather, God is so real", and "I have so much to be thankful for." Mind you, he was not one to look at things through rose coloured glasses. Before his first surgery, he told me that he was afraid as we sat there drinking coffee in the kitchen. There was no doubt that he was suffering but his hope rested on the knowledge that his Redeemer lives, a verse he liked to quote.

Later, after he passed away and I was back in British Columbia, I went to see a performance of Handel's Messiah at Easter, and I was reminded where my father was and was comforted. All of this is only possible because of the resurrection of Jesus.

So, this is what I am thinking about this Easter – how it is possible to have hope even in the most hopeless of situations, and that because He lives I can face tomorrow, whatever it has in store.

Who would have thought it possible? Who would have thought it possible that not too many days after his death, Lazarus would be there in the circle of his friends and family having dinner with Jesus? Who would have thought it possible?

The "Last Supper" was NOT the last supper. Who would have thought it possible that Jesus, after He had died, would be there in the midst of His disciples on Resurrection evening eating among them? Who would have thought it possible?

Who could imagine that we, together with our loved ones who have died already, we believers will all meet again, all be together in a glorious banquet with Jesus at His Coming. Who would think it possible? Jesus' Resurrection makes it possible. Not just possible, but certain. You can build your life on that.

It is impressive that Jesus, on the night He was betrayed, spent no time saying good bye. He had many things to say to His loved ones, but they were not words about parting in death. They were words about life. Jesus said, "Because I live, you also will live"[John 14: 19]. He said this just before His arrest, His crucifixion and his death. He was thinking not about death, but about life.

Jesus certainly had no thought that his death was the end. "You heard me say to you, 'I go away, and I will come to you. If you loved me you would have rejoiced, because I go to the Father; for the Father is greater than I" [John 14:28].

It was not the end. Jesus' death and resurrection was just the beginning. It was the beginning for His disciples of a new wonderful relationship of fellowship and love with Him and with the Father. Jesus said, "If anyone loves me, he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him"[John 14: 23]. He said "In that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you [John 14: 20]." What does this mean for us?

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Christ has won the victory!

We have available to us now, here and now, a fellowship of nearness, of one-ness with our Father and with Jesus and with Holy Spirit, never possible before.
We are not expected to live our lives at a distance from Jesus, to keep our distance from heaven, putting off the day as long as possible. We are to "draw near". Jesus said, "Abide in me and I in you." We are to enter into this fellowship; we are to grow in it, and "daily increase in the Holy Spirit more and more" as we Anglicans pray in the Confirmation Service. This is our gift right now. This is unthinkable privilege!

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What shall we say in response to this? I say, "Jesus, if you want to live with me, and have me live with you, then Glory! If you want to live with me so much that you were willing to die for me a dreadful and unappreciated death; if you rose from the grave to give me life, then Glory! Then, Jesus, you come right in now and take over all. More than anything I want to live with you." I am going to spend my days not dreading heaven, not trying to keep my distance. I am going to spend my days drawing nearer and nearer. Jesus said, "Abide in me and I in you." This is our life now, but not just now. It is forever.

"If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in glory" [Colossians 3: 1 - 4 ESV].

Jesus said, "Let not your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me. In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also. And you know the way to where I am going." Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me"[John 14 : 1 - 6 ESV].

Jesus told His beloved disciples over and over again about His betrayal, about His death, and most important, about His resurrection. Even the Pharisees and elders heard Jesus say that He would rise from the dead. They took it in and did their best to prevent it. But the disciples, for three terrible days lived as if it was not so. It is so, and we should live every

day as if it is so. Jesus' resurrection secures our future. This is for now and it is for ever.

We would be foolish to drift along through our days as if the resurrection is not so, as if there is no Lord Jesus alive today, as if there is no certain heaven lovely and glorious. The present and the future Jesus gives is so certain, so full of rich joys, so everlasting, so exactly what we long for in our deepest longings. It is eternal life!
