I was walking Matthew to school one morning this past week when he asked me, "Daddy,

why do we celebrate Thanksgiving? I know why we celebrate Christmas and Easter, but why Thanksgiving?"

I realize that Matthew is the second generation in our family to be raised off the farm. My father was raised on a farm and I was raised in King Township, surrounded by fields and farms. Life on a farm reminds us daily that God is our provider. We rely on his goodness to care for the seeds in the ground and the cattle in the field, to bring favourable weather and to grant us the strength to harvest. We plant the seed and pray.

Why Thanksgiving?

Life in the suburbs fosters the delusion of sanitized selfsufficiency. I go to work, I make money, I go to the grocery store where I purchase food that bears little or no resemblance to its original state. I'm even perturbed when my grocery store doesn't carry my chosen brand of pickles.

So, I explained to my little suburbanized boy, "Matthew, Thanksgiving is celebrated in the fall because that is when the fields are harvested. We take a day to give thanks to God for his provision; for his tender and practical care." Matthew thought about it for a moment and said, "Oh. O. K." Then he ran off to join in a game of basketball.

I turned around to walk home and carry on with my workday. Walking home, I began to wonder what my life would look like if I truly believed that everything I have comes

That thankfulness would displace any sense of entitlement. I would probably worry less and trust more.

James wrote to Christians spread throughout the Roman Empire reminding them,

"Do not be deceived, my beloved brothers. Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. Of his own will he brought us forth by the word of truth, that we should be a kind of first fruits of his creatures." James 1: 16-18 ESV

Every good thing comes from our good God whose goodness never changes. But to what end?

"Know this, my beloved brothers: let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger; for the anger of man does not produce the righteousness of God. Therefore put away all filthiness and rampant wickedness and receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls. But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving ourselves."

James 1: 19-22 ESV

When we truly understand the goodness of God we become good listeners, gracious, slow to anger and meek. Our thankfulness results in joyful obedience to God's word. Our mission partners write

From the Hendersons, Mission Aviation Fellowship, Angola

"Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for human masters, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving." Colossians 3:23

Reaching beyond our hospital community

Patients come to the CEML hospital from all of Angola, but our work ranges beyond the local area in other ways also. Audrey gave a Bible to one of our nurses, who passed it on to her son for whom she was concerned; he had recently moved to Luanda to study. The nurse later showed Audrey some Scripture verses he had sent her by text message and reported joyfully that he is reading regularly.

Health Care

One of many motorcycle accident victims suffered a serious leg fracture, and the local hospital simply put a cast over the open wound and protruding bone. Five months later our surgeons have aligned the bones properly and secured them with rods and screws. Since CEML receives no public funds, we must charge modest fees in order to break even. Public health care is largely "free" but patients may face unofficial charges!

Audrey has enjoyed helping some moms with breastfeeding, a big factor in reducing early deaths. One Thai wife was very grateful for help on how to care for a newborn, as her family was so far away.

Hyperglycemia is common but often not treated in a timely way; we have even admitted patients in diabetic coma. Audrey adapted some Canadian Diabetic Association diets to Angolan foods. Some diabetics have been told honey and brown sugar are OK for them!

Imports

We have put "the truck" to good use importing thousands of dollars of equipment for the hospital from Namibia and Norm has guided the process for other goods from South Africa and North America. Currently he is working on paperwork for \$45,000 of donated equipment as well as personal goods for a new missionary couple. Malaria is a problem even in dry season, so the mosquito nets we brought for the wards and the outpatient village are a real help. (Audrey also sprayed the hospital washrooms where mosquitoes thrive.)

Maintenance

Norm gets calls to help out when staff members have difficulty with the blood chemistry machines in the lab, when the sterilizer breaks down and even when the blood pressure machine stops working. Often there are parts required from overseas, and sometimes we can have our visitors bring these. In between, he works to improve the communications and IT system. He recently worked with Brent, a MAF pilot here, to install a new wireless link on a high tower that now con-

nects CEML with the city below.

One of the water tanks at the hospital developed a leak, so one afternoon "the truck" joined in the fun, winching the new tank up to the top of the water tower.

Visitors

Norm coordinates visitors to the hospital, helping with visas, advising what to expect, meeting them at the airport and helping with many little details. Many medical and other students have been inspired and challenged by visiting CEML – we expect during 2012 to have welcomed about 40 from the USA, Canada, and 5 other countries. Additional effort has gone into helping two recently-arrived doctor families settle in for long term assignments.

Ramon and I have been working teaching Spanish and English in order to make ends meet, even though the support we have received has been a true blessing, the Lord has provided. He is indeed faithful.

We use the classroom as a place to speak about Jesus as much as we are led to, finding it easier to bring Him up as the people we teach get to know us better. This has become part of our ministry, the Lord always surprises us since His ways are always different from what we thought they would be. Ramon continues to preach in an Evangelical Church, where he is "on call".

He had to go this summer to Venezuela to be with his mother who had surgery for cancer. She is doing well and we are thankful he was able to be with her for ten days.

We are trying to work towards building a bridge between the Catholics and the Evangelicals. We don't know how this is going to happen yet. Please pray for that.

The children are about to start school. Maria has two math tests, oral and written, that she must pass. Please pray for this. Jose is starting his last year of middle school and Ezekiel is going into grade 3.





As for me, please pray that I would be able to drive here because I have been taking the bus but the places I have to go to teach are not reachable by bus all the time. Even though I appreciate the walks sometimes it takes me too long from one place to another.

OM is doing well. We have received more volunteers. Please pray that there will be a good understanding among all of us. It is somehow difficult sometimes because there are many cultures involved, but thank God, the Holy Spirit is always present.

It brings me joy to pray for those at St. George's church who have been so good to us. You have no idea how much I love you. The Lord gives us a sense of family; He plants in our hearts a love that we would not be able to feel on our own. I thank Him and praise Him for this. Where would we be without Him?

Feeling drowsy?

"As the bridegroom was delayed, they all became drowsy and slept. But at midnight there was a cry, 'Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him.'" [Matthew 25:5 ESV]

Back in my exam-writing days, it would usually seem like a great idea in the evening to close my books and go to bed. I was tired after all. I would get up really, really early to study. During the night I would dream that I was up, and was working vigorously, learning all kinds of amazing things. In the morning it was all a dream, my books were still closed, all the amazing learning had been the stuff of dreams after all.

Pressure seems to have that effect on people. The more we should be alert and vigilant, the more we are drowsy and sleep. There are many admonitions to "wake up" in the Scriptures. It is easy to assume that we have lots and lots of time, that "tomorrow will be like this day, great beyond measure", but that is not the view of a believer.

This year the theme of the November ANiC synod strikes a note of urgency. "The night is far gone; the day is at hand. So then let us cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light." [Romans 13: 12] Time is far advanced. The night is far gone. We don't have plenty of time, days and days and days. The clock is ticking. Time is just about up. What just precedes the theme verse are the words "Besides this you know the time, that the hour has come for you to wake from sleep." [verse 11]

It is time to wake up! What is coming is wonderful! "The day is at hand" as the theme verse says. "For salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed" [verse 11].

What should we be doing? Being a citizen of the day, not the night, we should get dressed for action. Romans 13: 12 says, Put on "the armor of light" and even more explicit, "**Put on the Lord Jesus Christ**." Now that's our proper clothing for the day at hand.

Paul, the writer of these words felt the urgency of passing time. When he got up in the morning, what was his plan for the day? "But I do not account my life of any value nor as precious to myself, if only I may finish my course and the ministry that I received from the Lord Jesus, to testify to the gospel of the grace of God." [Acts 20: 24] Feeling drowsy? Time is passing! What is your plan for today?
