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Give tongues of fire and hearts of love

Tongues



In Genesis 3 Adam and Eve (and by extension the entire human family) failed to trust in

God's goodness and in His word. But the Lord was merciful in his judgment. By Genesis 6 the earth was covered with wickedness and every inclination of the thoughts of men was only evil all of the time. Again, The Good King was merciful in His judgment, sparing one man and his family.

In Genesis 11 the human family fails to trust in God's goodness and provision. Our forefathers set out to build a city, a tower that stretched to the heavens. This was no mere error of misguided technology, it was an overt attempt to dethrone the Lord God. It was a willful effort to place ourselves in the position of

Lord, Master and King over the creation. But God mercifully intervened. This time he gave diverse languages to confuse the workers and save them from themselves. The 'gift' of various languages prevented their construction project and flung the human family far and wide. While this may seem like harsh dealings, bear in mind that any other king would have crushed and destroyed such rebels.

Fast forward a few thousand years to the first feast of Pentecost following Jesus' death, burial, resurrection and ascension. Jerusalem is packed and crowded with Jews from all over the known world. They are all there to celebrate at the temple but feel distance from each other, struggling through language barriers.

And then it happens.
God, in His mercy, gives various
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languages and diverse tongues to the disciples while they were gathered praying. All of His people heard the story of Jesus and of the

coming Kingdom of God in their own language. Just as He used various languages to mercifully judge and separate His people in Genesis 4, saving them from their own rebellion, He was now using the gift of various languages to bring His people together. On that Pentecost day the gift of languages and tongues was used to bring about the reversal of isolation and separation.

If you were there on that day you would have seen the reversal of the fallout of the fall, the reversal of Genesis 11. You would have felt the electricity in the air, as hundreds and thousands of people saw the Kingdom of God breaking through all around them. The Lord of Heaven and Earth was drawing His people together.

Pentecost is the reminder that God is renewing all things. He is creating a new heaven and a new earth.

When humans try to create the Kingdom of God we always create idols. Through the misuse of technology we build cities and towers that represent our own rebellion against the Lord and King of the universe. But when the Spirit of God is at work, the Kingdom of God breaks through. The world of tomorrow breaks into today.

And we catch a glimpse of the coming Kingdom.

Jesus is proclaimed and seen as the

King. Rebellious people are restored to right relationship with their Lord and Master under His terms of amnesty, the cross. And all the King's people return from their isolation to rule and reign with Him in the new heaven and earth forever.

In one sense the church was formed on that first Pentecost. God's people were brought back together under their Lord and King, Jesus. Thousands heard the message of the King and His kingdom within a few days. They bowed their knee and began living the life of tomorrow today. The story goes on in Acts to tell us that the preaching of the kingdom added to their number daily.

That is what the Spirit of God does. He gathers God's people together, calling them out from distant places, altogether under one King, praising that King and longing for His Kingdom.

I pray that we at St. George's would be Pentecost people. I pray that we would continue to see the Spirit at work, placing a spotlight on Jesus, showing Him as King and gathering all of God's people together to long for His kingdom and praise the King.

My Call to the Diaconate



It was about four years ago that I went to my friend's ordination to the priesthood in England. During that trip, I met one of his friends who had just been ordained into the diaconate as a permanent deacon. He would continue working in his regular non-church related job. Not being from an Anglican background I did not know that there was such a position within the clergy. The seed had been planted; I began to think about being ordained to the diaconate.

I have always felt an attraction and a desire to serve the Church in some manner. I knew as a lay

person I could serve, but I wanted to serve with greater capacity and potential. I have had several friends enter the ministry full-time (as priests or pastors) but I've never had the desire nor felt the call to follow them into a full-time ministry (i.e. becoming a pastor of a church or preaching). I have always felt that I could rather serve the various pastors and church groups that I am involved with.

I prayed about my calling for another year and when I was confirmed at St. George's in 2011 I felt the call even stronger. A year after that, I finally mentioned this call to Ray David and he confirmed that this may indeed be a call from God. After a year or so of meeting with Bishop Charlie, working with an ordination discernment committee at St. George's and attending the DOVE retreat in Ottawa last year ,the call had been confirmed.

My ministry at St. George's will be mainly around the small groups and pastorates. As we prepare to enter a new neighbourhood and have a potential influx of new people, we will have a great need for coordination. I will be joined by my wife Carny to help coordinate small groups and pastorates. Carny has experience coordinating small groups so I'm grateful to have her as a partner. The coordination of these groups involves mainly resourcing and equipping small groups and their leaders. Also, due to the expected influx of people, there will be a need for new small groups to be formed. Carny and I will coordinate the creation of these new groups as well as train new leaders for these groups.

You can help too! If you want to join or lead a small group in your area, please contact Carny and me. We would be happy to find a place for you in an existing small group or provide some resources for starting a new small group.

What Is Lovely About Pentecost



"In the last days it shall be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh [Acts 2:17]." "It shall be." "God declares" it. This is God's promise and He has done it. What those disciples received was also for us. "The promise is for you and for your children and for all who are far off, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to himself." [Acts 2:39]

What is lovely about Pentecost is the abundance of the outpouring of the Spirit. The very words "I will pour out" suggest abundance. There is no carefulness here, no indication of a certain amount measured out, no rationing. This Pentecostal outpouring was generous and abundant.

This generous outpouring is lovely because the gift is precious. It is God with us not just for the moment, but forever! The Spirit is life [Romans 8]. It is the mark of God's adoption and His ownership of us [Ephesians 1: 13,14]. It is the mark of our inheritance. When we have the Holy Spirit we are heirs of the Kingdom!

It is an overflowing pouring out of love, God's love poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us [Romans 5: 5]. It is a steady outpouring of God's love, security forever and ever. Who wouldn't want that?


It is the Holy Spirit, the Holy Spirit who washes us, the Holy Spirit who renews us, "the Spirit poured out upon us richly through Jesus Christ, our Savior" [Titus 3:5,6]. Who doesn't need washing? Who doesn't long for renewal?

The abundance of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit is lovely because the Spirit brings "times of refreshing" from the Lord. The Spirit brings about a flourishing of life, an abundant blossoming of the wilderness, the dry land and the desert [Isaiah 35]. The prophet Isaiah spoke longingly of the Lord "opening rivers on the bare heights, and fountains in the midst of valleys, the wilderness becoming a pool of water, and

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the dry land springs of water [Isaiah 41; 18]." Through Isaiah the Lord declared, "I will pour water on the thirsty land, and streams on the dry ground; I will pour my Spirit on your offspring and my blessing on your descendants. They shall spring up among the grass like willows by flowing streams" [Isaiah 44: 3,4]. It makes no sense at all except to a person who longs for "times of refreshment". The Spirit provides times of refreshment and He provides abundantly. Who wouldn't want this for ourselves and for our children as the Lord declares?

The ministry of the Spirit is a witness to Jesus. The Spirit is a witness to righteousness. The voice of the Spirit is a voice of conviction, conviction of sin, conviction of righteousness, and a conviction of judgment [John 16:7-14]. Who wouldn't want that? Genuine conviction of sin from the Holy Spirit, and true repentance is the only pathway to the Savior. Who wouldn't want that? It is God's gift! It is the outpouring of God's gift of grace that we desperately need. No marshmallow gospel can do the work of genuine conviction, genuine repentance, turning from sin, and genuine taking hold of Jesus.

The Outpouring of the Spirit is lovely because the Holy Spirit is the Spirit of power. The great Baptist preacher Spurgeon(19th century) spoke of the unimaginable power of wind and fire combined, power impossible to resist. That is the power of the Holy Spirit! But it is not a destructive force; it is the power of God, the power of truth, the power of right-eousness, the power of healing mercy. Every time we read the account of that Pentecost, fifty days after Jesus' resurrection, we should be totally amazed at the record of the power of God's Spirit working in stony hearts as Peter and the disciples urged them to repent. When have we ever witnessed such scenes of multitudes melted and turning to the Lord? When have we ever witnessed such great boldness and power of witness? When have we ever known such great grace upon the people of God as in those days [Acts 4: 31 – 33]? I long for our day to be such a day!

When those early disciples heard that a gift was coming in not many days, they waited eagerly. They banded together, all of them, and they devoted themselves to prayer [Acts 1;14] Jesus said that human fathers are willing to give good gifts to their children and "how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!" [Luke 11: 13]. "The promise is for us, and for our children and for all who are far off, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to himself." *Mary Ann Masters*
