SERIES FOREWARD

Jesus' parable of the persistent widow is introduced in Luke 18:1 with the words, "And he told them a parable to the effect that they ought always to pray and not lose heart. He said ...". While there are many other passages in scripture where prayer is both instructed and described, this one always stands out to me for its simplicity and tenacity. Christians ought to pray. Christians who pray do not lose heart.

The instruction to pray is a reminder and a joy, not a burden. Prayer recalibrates and reorients our drifting hearts and affections. The tyranny of the urgent readily distracts us from the glorious privilege that is ours in Christ Jesus. Our attention is drawn toward busyness and away from the precious life-giving resource we have been given in prayer. Jesus has reconciled us to God. Now we can pray to God as to a loving Father (Matthew 6:9).

I struggle with sustaining a disciplined pattern of regular prayer. Desperate, sincere, in-the-moment prayer comes easily whenever I hear of or think about someone in need. Yet my heart longs for more. My soul is hungry and thirsty for daily nourishment found only in setting aside regular, intentional time with my Father. I suppose this is something every Christian feels, at least to some extent.

Throughout the centuries, Christians have prayed at assigned hours, particularly in the morning and evening. Our rich Anglican heritage has given us the Daily Offices of Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer. We have adapted these traditional Daily Offices into the book you are now holding in your hand. These books will be produced and distributed to our church family quarterly. Would you commit to join us in praying these daily prayers throughout the coming year?

Let me say a few things about Daily Prayer:

1

First, you will notice that each day includes both prayer and Bible reading. Charles Spurgeon was asked, “What is more important, prayer or bible reading?” He answered, “I ask, ‘What is more important, breathing in or breathing out.’” This is the genius of our Anglican tradition. It builds prayer around scripture reading and bathes scripture reading in prayer. You can expect to spend 15 minutes each morning and evening.

Second, some of the liturgical prayers use first person plural pronouns. They say “we” and “us”. While many of us will pray these prayers alone we find strength and encouragement remembering that our church family prays these same prayers with us, in a sense. Think of these daily prayers as corporate prayer done individually.

Third, our church family is comprised mostly of new or mature Christians who have come from other Christian denominations. The practice of daily, liturgical prayer may seem odd at best. You may even recoil from the idea out of a concern for repetition. Remember that Jesus did not forbid repetition, per se, but vain or empty repetition (Matthew 6:7). These written prayers will serve a few good purposes in your walk with Jesus. They establish determined times to pray in the morning and evening. Think of it as putting your life on rails by starting and ending the day in God's word and prayer.

Written prayers also enrich our vocabulary in talking about, thinking about and serving the Lord. This is a sentiment captured in the motto *Lex Orandi, Lex Credendi*, literally meaning "What is Prayed" is "What is Believed".

Our team has prepared this resource for you. Bryan, Dan and Brock have poured over Anglican prayer books, developed a lectionary, and beta-tested it. I am eager to grow in the discipline of Daily Prayer, I commit to doing it and commend it to you wholeheartedly.

Romans 12:12 says, "...be constant in prayer." 1 Thessalonians 5:17 says, "Pray without ceasing ...". Colossians 4:2 says, "Continue steadfastly in prayer ...".

Always pray and do not lose heart.

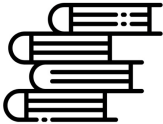

PROFILES

SAINTS FROM THE PAST

Profiles

Throughout this book, you will have come across prayers and quotes from Christians throughout the ages. Below are short profiles to help you become acquainted with each of these faithful men of God.

THOMAS CRANMER

Thomas Cranmer (1489–1556) was the first Reformed Archbishop of Canterbury and, in the earliest days of the Anglican Church, no figure exercised as great an influence. He was the primary author of the Anglican Book of Common Prayer.

RECOMMENDED READING: “THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER”.

RICHARD SIBBES

Richard Sibbes (1577–1635) was a puritan Anglican minister in England. He was known in his time as the “heavenly doctor” for both his preaching and his holy life. He possessed a unique ability to expose the sinner’s disease while also providing the soothing remedy of Christ in the gospel.

RECOMMENDED READING: “THE BRUISED REED”.

MARTIN LUTHER

Martin Luther (1483–1546) is remembered as one of the fathers of the protestant reformation. His dedication to the gospel brought about widespread reforms in the church that exist to this day.

RECOMMENDED READING: “THE BONDAGE OF THE WILL”.

J.C. RYLE

J.C. Ryle (1816–1900) was the first bishop of Liverpool. He was an outstanding and beloved exponent of the evangelical and reformed faith. He is remembered as being “Bold as a lion for the truth of God’s Word and his Gospel.”

RECOMMENDED READING: “THE CROSS OF CHRIST”.

J.I. PACKER

J.I. Packer (1926-2020) was a Canadian Anglican evangelical theologian and writer. He is widely recognized as one of the most influential theologians of the twentieth century.

RECOMMENDED READING: "KNOWING GOD".

MARTYN LLOYD-JONES

Martyn Lloyd-Jones (1899-1981), a Welsh minister, preacher, and medical doctor, stands as one of the most influential figures in 20th-century Reformed evangelicalism.

RECOMMENDED READING: "STUDIES IN THE SERMON ON THE MOUNT".

MATTHEW HENRY

Matthew Henry (1662-1714) was an English puritan, preacher, and author of one of the most popular biblical commentaries ever written.

RECOMMENDED READING: "COMPLETE COMMENTARY ON THE BIBLE".

SAMUEL RUTHERFORD

Samuel Rutherford (1600-1661) was a Scottish pastor and theologian and one of the main authors of the Westminster Confessions.

RECOMMENDED READING: "THE LOVELINESS OF CHRIST".

THOMAS WATSON

Thomas Watson (1620-1686) was an English Puritan preacher and author known for his sound, heart-searching exposition of Scripture.

RECOMMENDED READING: "ALL THINGS FOR GOOD".

CHARLES SPURGEON

Charles Spurgeon (1834-1892) was an English pastor who was known in the 19th century as the "prince of preachers" for his fervent, Christ-centered preaching.

RECOMMENDED READING: "ALL OF GRACE".

JOHN FLAVEL

John Flavel (1627-1691) was an English Puritan minister and author. One of his hearers said, “that person must have a very soft head, or a very hard heart, or both, that could sit under his ministry unaffected”.

RECOMMENDED READING: “KEEPING THE HEART”.

ARTHUR DENT

Arthur Dent (1552-1607) was an English Puritan author and preacher, born in Melton, Leicestershire.

LEWIS BAYLY

Lewis Bayly (1575-1631) was an English Puritan Bishop and author who wrote one of the most popular devotionals ever written - “The Practice of Piety”.

CLEMENT OF ROME

Born around AD 35, Clement of Rome may have been the same Clement that the apostle Paul mentioned in Philippians 4. The prayer of confession included in this book was taken from a pastoral letter to believers in Corinth.
